Photographer, Richard Murai shares his dynamic photographs of life in Bhutan. /aried in style and mood, these sepia-toned images of daily life and cultural traditions, including portraits and cityscapes, are powerfully poetic.

In his own words: "Ongoing global unrest has caused extreme uncertainty, economic hardship, and a difficult emotional time for all. We continue to confront a perplexing, irrational, and extremely precarious world situation. Reluctance to accept diverse cultural, political and religious influences both here and abroad adds to the apprehension, cynicism and confusion. Becoming sensitive to unfamiliar cultures can quell much of this anxiety and may encourage tolerance and compassion. The act of picture making adds immeasurably to my understanding of the world. And the final photographs, although worlds apart, provide a reaffirmation of the oneness of the human spirit".

Mixed Media Printmaker Mary Robinson, an art professor from South Carolina, gives us her elegant and complex prints, all in tones of black, white and grey. Her patterns and textures weave intricate passageways for our eyes to follow. Bold as well as subtle, her mark making is calligraphic and engaging. **She tells us,** "I am deeply inspired by natural forms, especially tree roots, tangled vines and human arteries. I observe complex patterns of flowing, twisting fibers, and nature's mode of creating variety within repetition. I use similar forms in my mixed media drawings and prints to express the mix of awe, reverence and anxiety I feel 'iving on Earth in the Twenty-First Century''.



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The Allen Griffin Teaching Award is an award funded by the Community Foundation for Monterey County to reward and stimulate outstanding teaching. Award winners receive a cash award and a commemorative certificate.

The Allen Griffin Teaching Awards were established in 1982 by a bequest from Colonel Allen Griffin, a founder and former President of the Community Foundation for Monterey County and for many years a community leader in education and other fields. By designating the Allen Griffin Fund within the Community Foundation for annual teaching awards to outstanding teachers, Colonel Griffin intended both to reward and to stimulate superior teaching. Income from the fund is used for cash awards to outstanding teachers from the public secondary schools and the major accredited institutions of post-secondary education on the Monterey Peninsula. One teacher will be selected to receive an award from each eligible institution.

At MPC, the Professional Recognition Board (PRB) will review the nominations and will forward a recommendation to the Community Foundation for MPC's Allen Griffin Award winner for 2015.

- a. Eligibility: The Allen Griffin Award winner must be a full-time classroom teacher with at least three years of classroom teaching experience who has taught for at least the past two years at MPC. Previous award winners are not eligible (please refer to attached list).
- b. Nominations: Nominations should present evidence that the nominee has demonstrated sustained excellence in classroom teaching and has had a positive impact beyond the classroom at MPC, in his/her profession, and in his/her community. Current PRB members are not eligible to submit nominations.

# Please provide detailed information in a narrative format to support your nomination, keeping in mind all of the elements listed under b. Nominations in the guidelines provided above.



Dear Campus Administration, Faculty, and staff,

The Student Health Services is gearing up to participate in an exciting public awareness event. **The Red Flag Campaign** addresses dating violence awareness on college campuses during the month of April. As a member of the faculty and staff at MPC, you know that one of student's greatest interests on campus is seeking out relationships with peers- both friendships and dating relationships. Unfortunately, not every relationship is healthy or positive; dating violence happens in 1 out of 5 intimate relationships in college. **The Red Flag Campaign** features a series of six posters that illustrate "red flags" that might be bresent in a relationship in which dating violence is happening. Each poster reflects one of the following themes: coercion, emotional abuse, sexual assault, victim-blaming, excessive jealousy, isolation. An example of a helpful peer response is also provided on each poster.

The purpose of **The Red Flag Campaign** is to encourage students to speak up when they see red flags for dating violence in their friends' relationships. Supplementing the poster series will be a forum held in the Student Center Almaden room with the support of local domestic violence agencies. Additionally, **The Red Flag Campaign** website,


The seminar will be recorded for those who are unable to attend in person on April 17<sup>th</sup>. Instructions for accessing the video recording will be provided at a later date.

### **Theater review: MPC's 'Jungle Book' brings the happy** By Dodie Barkley

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"The Jungle Book," adapted by Monica Flory from the stories of Rudyard Kipling and now on the Morgan Stock Stage at Monterey Peninsula College, is a fun-loving swing through the vines.

With a mesmerizing set designed by Carey Crockett and clever mask and costume designs by Gloria C. Mattos Hughes, the play offers the audience an entertaining safari filled with animals who have taken over an ancient Indian temple in the jungle.

Director Gary Bolen and crew put together a happy cast, enacting a story of a lost baby adopted by a pack of wolves and a ferocious tiger who would sooner take the child for an afternoon snack.

Mowgli the wolf-boy (Justin Azevedo) grows up finding that he is different from his animal family. "You don't have a tail and you don't have hair all over your body," his wolf brother points out. "You are just a human!" That is the basic drive of the story as Mowgli ponders his future: Should he remain being a wolf, or should he leave the animals to find other human beings?

As he playfully scampered through the jungle with three wayward baby chimps, played by Lauren Hoelscher, Alina Flanary and Melissa Kamnikar, what came to mind were simple words — cute and adorable, especially when they copied Mowgli's movements in a classic "monkey see, monkey do," scene. And Bolen carried it further in their bows at the finale — they did another classic "hear no evil, see no evil, speak no evil."

Lane Edgington as Baloo, a very lovable bear, tutors Mowgli. In showing him how to interact with the other animals in the jungle, he says, "To put fear into an adversary, stare into his eyes, and he will no longer bother you." That's advice Mowgli will take to the scary tiger Shere Kahn, portrayed by big-voiced actor Roland Shorter.

Bolen kept the actors on their toes, making everyone in the cast a standout. The snake and the vulture-like birds, among others, delivered finely drawn, energetic renditions of the animals.

Although "The Jungle Book" is decidedly scripted for a young audience, adults will want to find out what Mowgli decides.

# The revered expert of the external challenges and the inner resolves of the underdog hits MPC to talk writing. By Walter Ryce

She began writing as a child and the 76-year-old hasn't slowed down, publishing waves of material she writes in longhand. Her bibliography has its own Wikipedia page, separate from hers, filled with lists of her 40 novels (each of those with its own Wikipedia page) including them (1969), an installment of her Wonderland series that won her the National Book Award, and Black Water (1992), What I Lived For (1994) and the Marilyn Monroe historical fiction Blonde (2000), all of which were nominated for Pulitzers. (There's been long-running odds betting on when she's going to win that elusive Pulitzer.) She's published novels under the pseudonyms Rosamond Smith (eight of them) and Lauren Kelly. She's turned out dozens of short story collections including Where Are You Going, Where Have You Been? (made into a movie starring Laura Dern), and last year's Lovely, Dark, Deep. She's written poems, plays, criticism, essays, novellas, memoir, kids books, an e-book. She's published so much that Michael Dirda in the New York Times pondered, "Where does one start?" The Rocky Mountain News suggested starting with the short stories. But she herself prefers discussing, via email, her newest work, The Sacrifice, a fictional novel based on actual events - the Tawana Brawley case of 1987-88. The Guardian liked the book: "We see how, in the hands of a great writer, a gripping story can be torn from the poisonous rubble." She is one of the most admired living writers and teachers. She taught at Princeton for 35 years, has been lecturing at UC Berkeley, and speaks at Monterey Peninsula College's Guest Authors Series (\$20) 7pm Thursday.

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### Weekly: Are there any genres you haven't tried and would like to?

Joyce Carol Oates: I am most engaged by the classical genres – novel, poetry, short story. I am not so interested in situation comedies, for instance, or blogs.

### You run. What's been a profound idea or thought that has arrived to you while running?

I think of my work every time I run or walk – that is, every day. These are likely to be practical ideas more often than "profound" ideas.

### Do you consider yourself an advocate for minority, oppressed or disenfranchised people? How much does that inform your writing in *The Sacrifice*?

I would not say that I am an "advocate" – that sounds like social work or legal defense work. Writers concentrate on creating sympathetic characters in worlds that mimic the real world – my hope in *The Sacrifice* is to evoke sympathy and identity on the part of readers to whom the world of the novel is not familiar. Racial issues are not specialized issues in the U.S. but primary, essential.

# There seems to be more conflagrations of police and state power, race, poverty, class and guilt these days. What do you see as the most divisive issue in America right now?

There may be two: the economic (the increasing gap between the very wealthy and the rest of the country, who pay a disproportionate amount of taxes and other fees) and, linked to this, the political (the use of law enforcement officers to maintain racist boundaries while protecting the property of the wealthy). Much focus on the Middle East by the media allows us to pretend that all is well at home.

### What are your thoughts on John Steinbeck?

Steinbeck is an impassioned, gifted spokesman for the dispossessed. His work is rich in regional color, texture, life.

### Are there any online streaming shows that have captured your attention?

*The Wire* is excellent – like the old *Homicide: Life on the Streets. House of Cards* is skillfully presented but very hollow and shallow – indeed, a "house of cards" that can collapse at any moment.

### How do you feel about your teaching career at Princeton coming to a close?

I have retired as a full-time faculty member at Princeton but will teach one workshop from time to time in the creative writing program there (as I will be teaching in fall 2015).

### What do you think of California now that you've moved to [the Bay Area]?

We are renting a beautiful Julia Morgan-designed house on Panoramic Way, above the university, in Berkeley. But we will be leaving in May.

### If you win the Pulitzer, what will you say in your acceptance speech?

I don't think there is an acceptance speech for this prize...

## MPC teachers dispute deficit spending numbers

As Monterey Peninsula College administrators negotiate with teachers and staff for a new contract, members of the faculty union are claiming the college's much publicized deficit spending is not as steep as administrators have said.

But the school's president says the spending deficit is real and that it has been covered by a shrinking pool of self-insurance money.

The Monterey Peninsula College Teachers Association says it has found the deficit spending has been a lot less than the \$2.5 million a year district officials have reported recently, union president Paola Gilbert told trustees at its most recent meeting.

"We looked at all the funds," Gilbert told The Herald on Monday. "If you're in a deficit situation, those funds would go down. Once you take out the money that's used for the bond, other funds have increased quite a bit — all the funds together, unrestricted and restricted."

The deficit could be as little as \$300,000 a year, Gilbert said.

Fueling the teachers' skepticism was a surge in revenue for 2012 that allowed the teachers to get back a 2.02-percent salary concession they had previously given up. But the college did not give the money as soon as those funds came through; the union had to file a grievance to get the money, officials said.

The 2.02-percent concession notwithstanding, the ongoing \$2.5 million deficit spending is real, MPC President Walter Tribley said.

"A large part of our budget is the unrestricted general fund, primarily through apportionment. Those funds are not coming in at the level that's meeting our outgoing expenses. That's the piece to focus on," Tribley said. "Our self-insurance fund is getting smaller. We have been using that fund to cover the gap between ongoing revenue."

The college had \$7.5 million in the self-insurance fund at the end of the 2013-14 school year, and administrators project the fund will go down to \$5.3 million at the end of the 2015 school year, Tribley said.

The college district does keep a 10-percent reserve and that has remained steady over the last few years, Tribley said.

Allegations over budgetary discrepancies are arising in the midst of contract negotiations, where MPC administrators want to get concessions from employees in the health care department.

MPC is self-insured, which means administrators keep a fund to pay for medical expenses, both of current employees and retirees. The expenses are about \$6 million a year, administrators said.

But college officials are exploring a way to cut health care costs down to \$3 million a year, and an ad-hoc committee has looked into transitioning into a conventional health insurance plan — where employees would have to shoulder more of the expenses in the form of premiums.

Administrators "are claiming there could be a \$3 million difference by moving to a provider," Gilbert said. "The only reason there's a difference is they're going to pay so little of the premiums."

According to the college's proposal, a family would have to pay \$770 a month in premiums, Gilbert said, if they moved to a conventional health care plan. That would be a big financial blow to a group of already underpaid teachers.

"It is demoralizing that the district is fixated on cutting benefits when we are among the lowest paid faculty in the state, haven't had a raise in seven years, and have lost 16.3 percent buying power as measured by CPI increases over that time," Alan Haffa, a member of the college's health welfare cost containment committee, told trustees during Wednesday's meeting. "The proposed health care spending limit would put us at the very bottom of peer group schools in terms of health care too. Bad pay and bad benefits are not the way to reward employees who have sacrificed and helped you get through the last seven, difficult years."

Haffa asked trustees to direct administrators to find ways to increase revenues and enrollment. The number of full-time students at the college, which is its largest source of unrestricted money, has declined.

"I'd like for all our employees to be compensated better, there's nothing I would rather do than see that happen," Tribley said. "It's difficult to do at this time, we need to look at the financial situation and shift from one place to another and it's not coming from added revenue from the state." .

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## **Clarisa Cortez pitches MPC past Ohlone**

When former Monterey High softball ace Clarisa Cortez made the jump to Monterey Peninsula College, it didn't take long to find out the increased difficulty in facing hitters at the college level.

"I got rocked in my very first game," the sophomore pitcher said about her debut with the Lobos. "That kind of put in my head that I need to start working harder."

Things eventually clicked for Cortez in 2013 as she finished second in the state in ERA. After missing 2014 to an injury, the right-handed pitcher is back in the groove with MPC (22-11). Cortez earned her 18th win of the season on Tuesday, a 6-3 victory over Ohlone College of Fremont, giving her the third-most victories by a pitcher in the state this year.

The adjustment to pitching in college didn't come easy for Cortez, the 2012 Monterey Bay League Pitcher of the Year. In addition to pitching every day in practice and working on her physique, Cortez said one of the biggest changes she made was asking for constructive criticism.

"I've known her off and on since she was probably in the eighth grade and the one thing I can tell you is she's always been open to instruction and she's not afraid of hard work," MPC coach Keith Berg said.

Berg helped Cortez last season with her different pitches and her grips on the ball. Prior to taking the helm with the Lobos, Berg was a pitching coach with West Valley College.

"Just working with him (this year) and having the whole year with him — he's amazing," Cortez said. "Without him, I probably wouldn't have as much spin as I do now with my pitches."

Cortez allowed three runs on five hits against Ohlone (19-12). Her 1.83 earned run average coming into Tuesday's game ranks sixth in the state among pitchers with at least 100 innings pitched. After being more of a fastball pitcher in high school, Cortez now blends speed with finesse on the mound.

"The most important pitch in softball is definitely the change-up," Berg said. "At pretty much every level you want to go to as you get older, they want that change-up on command. She's worked hard on disguising it, hiding the ball in her hand and keeping the arm swing looking like a fastball." The Lobos will need Cortez on the top of her game as they prepare for the homestretch. MPC is in the thick of the playoff chase in the final three weeks of the Coast Conference season. The top 16 teams in Northern California advance to the postseason. MPC is ranked 11th in the coaches poll and 10th in rating percentage index in NorCal.

MPC is one of the more well-rounded teams, ranking ninth in the state in runs scored. The Lobos' offense did most of its damage in the first inning against Ohlone, scoring five runs. Salinas High alumna Samantha Luna drilled the first pitch she saw for a triple into right-center field. Corina Salinas, Janell Godfrey, Justine Armento, Cortez and Victoria Smith drove in runs in the first. Godfrey finished the game a homer short of the cycle with two RBIs.

The MPC defense shined as well on Tuesday, with multiple players making diving catches to take hits away from Ohlone.

"I have a really good defense behind me," Cortez said.

While Cortez has no shortage of inspiration, she can find more at any time by looking down at her wrist. She wears a bracelet that reads, "... until we meet again," in memory of former Santa Catalina softball player Fatima Larios, who died in January in her dorm room at Chadron State in Nebraska. Cortez also had Larios' initials tattooed in her wrist. The two friends were so close, they used to joke that they were cousins. Cortez draws a "3" on her cheek in eye black before each game to honor her friend.

"Part of the reason I'm trying to dominate out here is because I have to finish what she started," Cortez said. "I have to do it for myself and for her."
