

As noted below, our flag is being flown at half-staff today to honor President Abraham Lincoln on the Day of Remembrance and to honor the victims of the Boston Marathon Bombings of April 15, 2013.

country is perfected and our liberty preserved.

President Lincoln understood the immense sacrifices required to give meaning to our founding principles. With enduring faith and steady resolve, he led our Nation through Civil War, knowing the blood shed was in painful service to those same ideals. He sought to reunite our people not only in Government, but also in a freedom that knew no bounds of color or creed. It was in this spirit that he issued the Emancipation Proclamation, forever joining the cause of our Union with the advancement of liberty. As our Nation gave birth to a new era of freedom, President Lincoln charted a course that would help bind the wounds of a divided country and bring healing to a people who desperately needed it.

Even while his Presidency was characterized by war, his ambition was a just and lasting peace. Amid the discord of great conflict, President Lincoln demonstrated the wisdom to look forward. He knew a united America could serve the hopes of all its people if they seized the opportunity of their time. He established land-grant colleges and committed to a railroad connecting East to West, even as he fought to hold together North and South. He fueled new enterprises with a national currency, spurred innovation, and ignited America's imagination with a National Academy of Sciences.


As we reflect on the Great Emancipator, we are reminded that we will be remembered for what we choose to make of the moment we are given. President Lincoln has passed on a tremendous legacy to us, and we too are called to do great things. His example gives us confidence that whatever trials await us, this Nation and the freedom we cherish can, and will, prevail. Today, we reflect on the extraordinary progress he made possible, and with one voice, we rededicate ourselves to the work of ensuring a Government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim April 15, 2015, as a Day of Remembrance for President Abraham Lincoln. I call upon all Americans to honor his life and legacy with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities. I also call upon the Governors of the United States and its Territories, and appropriate officials of all units of government, to direct that the flag be flown at half-staff on the Day of Remembrance for President Abraham Lincoln. I further encourage all Americans to display the flag at half-staff from their homes and businesses on that day.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this fourteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord two thousand fifteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and thirty-ninth.

Please be advised that Massachusetts Governor Charlie Baker has ordered the United States flag and the Commonwealth flag be **lowered** to half-staff at all state buildings from sunrise to sunset on Wednesday, April 15, 2015 in honor of the individuals who lost their lives and were injured during the Boston Marathon Bombings of April 15, 2013.

This gubernatorial order applies to:

- 1. The main or administration building of each public institution of the Commonwealth, e.g. town and city halls
- 2. Other state-owned or state-controlled buildings
- 3. All state military installations

For two millennia, humankind has created paper by hand. Whatever the intention behind the paper, every fiber that goes into the making of paper has a story to tell.

Peace Paper Project uses the ancient tradition of hand papermaking as a vehicle for personal expression and cultural change. Paper is no longer just a chapter in a history textbook; it has become a beacon for socially engaged art.

The process of making paper is a direct manifestation of resilience, as it requires breaking something down in order to create something new and beautiful. Through direct collaboration with art therapists, **Peace Paper** brings papermaking to healing populations. From clinical settings to community art centers, we use paper as an expressive tool for coping with trauma.

Our portable studio enables us to use paper as a form of public intervention. By setting up in urban centers and student unions, the public is invited to become participants in papermaking processes that address specific social issues. **Panty Pulping** is an example: on college campuses, this project invites students to stand in solidarity against sexual and domestic violence through making paper out of unmentionables. **Papermaking with invasive aquatic plants** is another exciting public action piece. Using pedal power, communities transform non-native plants into pulp for papermaking that reflects the human imprint on the environment.

Since 2011, we have helped develop 14 papermaking programs that operate in the **Peace Paper** spirit of using the process as a tool for healing and public interaction. We are dedicated to helping strengthen communities through our workshops, interventions and training opportunities.





Governmental Accounting

- * Government Accounting Standards Board for governmental entities
- * State Chancellor's Office, Budget and Accounting Manual
- * Fund Accounting is Required for operations including submitting financial reports to the state. Modified accrual accounting
- * The exception is the Annual Audit Report where all financials are based on accrual accounting



- * All transactions are recorded in one of several "funds" – a self balancing set of accounts that captures all similar types of transactions
- * Governmental, Fiduciary and Trust fund types
- Agency providing funds typically requires a separate accounting of costs and revenues – restricted to agency's prescribed purposes
- * Funds are moved from fund to fund and it confuses EVERYONE over time



Follow the Money

- Look for inter-fund transfers what goes into the Unrestricted General Fund and what goes out to other funds
- Are you supporting yourself on a year-to-year basis or are you using money from another fund – these are key issues everyone should be aware of as the entity as a whole is examined

General Commentary


- DO ANYTHING !!! Take control of the situation so you don't get whiplash or have to face other unfavorable consequences







In addition to the underwater mission tasks, the students will exhibit poster displays that describe their vehicle, its various control, buoyancy, and propulsion systems, and the members of their team. The students will also deliver a presentation about the science and engineering behind their vehicle to a group of professional engineers and ROV pilots/technicians from local organizations, such as the Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute. During their presentation, the students will have the opportunity to learn more about these industry professionals and the work that they do – and hopefully become inspired to pursue careers in ocean science, technology, and engineering!

All total, we expect 300 students, instructors, parents, cheerleaders, judges, and volunteers to take part. We encourage you to join us for this fun, exciting, and educational event!

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA A PROCLAMATION

Each May, our Nation salutes the American women and men who put their lives on the line every day to maintain public safety and hold accountable those who break the law. On Peace Officers Memorial Day and during Police Week, we recognize all those who have dedicated their lives to this vital task. With heavy hearts, we mourn the heroes taken from us only because they chose to serve, and we rededicate ourselves to carrying forward their noble legacy.

Our law enforcement officers have extraordinarily tough jobs. They regularly work in dangerous environments and in difficult, high-tension situations. And they often face challenges deeply rooted in systemic problems and broader social issues. These professionals serve to protect their communities and strengthen their Nation, and they deserve to go home safely to their loved ones at the end of each shift. As President, I am committed to making sure America's dedicated police officers receive the support and recognition they have earned, and to doing all I can to protect those who protect us.

I call upon all Americans to observe these events with appropriate ceremonies and activities. I also call on the Governors of the United States and its Territories, and appropriate officials of all units of government, to direct that the flag be flown at half-staff on Peace Officers Memorial Day. I further encourage all Americans to display the flag at half-staff from their homes and businesses on that day.



A teacher of teachers comes to MPC to remind us why culture matters.

You read a book, you listen to a piece of music, you see a work of art. It seems in all these things we're looking for something about ourselves: our values, emotions, thoughts, persona, philosophies. We seek out culture to find ourselves. David Steiner, Ph.D, is trained to help us do that.

He's served as director of arts education at the National Endowment for the Arts, as commissioner of education for the state of New York, and is now the dean of the School of Education at City University of New York's Hunter College.

He visits Monterey Peninsula College Friday as part of the school's Great Books Program to speak on "The Humanities at Risk: Why We Should Champion Great Art, Great Music and Great Books."

The topic has a number of issues hidden in it. The humanities include academic disciplines like art, religion, music, history, language, theater, things that describe our culture and the ways we try to understand ourselves and our world.

And why are the humanities at risk? Jobs, says Steiner. They used to be a place of broad study to earn "our inheritance" from past masters, he says. Not anymore. Students are leaving it behind in favor of study in vocations like business, medicine, law and environmental sciences.

"To be educated [once] meant to be liberally educated in the liberal arts. The argument has shifted to what you might need for the job market," Steiner says

Also it's at risk of being held captive by academics who decide what the "great" works of Western culture should be that constitute the humanities – often centered around Shakespeare, T.S. Eliot, Chaucer, Hawthorne, Melville, etc. Dead white men, it's been referred to. It also used to be the province of the elite classes. But that's shifting.

"Different students will gravitate to hip-hop, Jackson Pollock, Balanchine, what they saw on the subway wall," Steiner says. "The thing itself is less important than a set of interactions. It's what they do with it, how they interact with it, share it."

Steiner says there is another way, a third way, to regard the humanities, and to value them. What is it? "I don't want to give away too much," he says. "If you're invited to give an important talk, it seems the basic moral courtesy is to [talk about] something new."

Former Seaside High, MPC lineman Terry Poole prepares for NFL draft

The anxiety you feel as a kid just before Christmas. The anticipation of what's in the package. Starring at the clock.

That's what Terry Poole is feeling 48 hours before the NFL draft.

"It's like waiting to open that Christmas present," Poole said.

With one significant difference.

Poole has been dreaming about this moment since he was that little kid.

"This is a dream come true," Poole said. "It's coming to fruition."

The former Seaside High and Monterey Peninsula College offensive tackle has been projected to go anywhere between the second and fifth rounds of the NFL draft, which begins on Thursday in Chicago.

"I'm not too nervous," said Poole, who will watch the draft with family and friends in Monterey. "I know I will be somewhere. I'm just ready to get to work."

Over the past month, the 6-foot-6, 315-pounder has worked out with the Arizona Cardinals, Houston Texans, Philadelphia Eagles and Seattle Seahawks. All 32 NFL teams have contacted him since the NFL combine in February.

"Teams have been calling every day, making sure they have the right contact number," said Poole, who spent the past two years starting at San Diego State. "Teams keep telling me they are very interested and I'm on their draft board. It's about who will get me first."

Where that will be is a mystery to Poole.

While a handful of teams have expressed a great deal of interest and have remained in constant contact with Poole, a team's needs may change by the minute, depending on who is available on the draft board at that moment.

"I don't want to get my hopes up," said Poole, who has spent his entire 23 years on the West Coast. "You can't depend on what people are saying or projecting. A couple of teams seem really interested. But is it in the third or fifth round?" Poole, who didn't play his senior year at Seaside High for personal reasons, turned his life around at MPC, becoming a demon in the trenches and a student in the classroom.

"The great redemption quality with Terry is school was actually important to him," MPC football coach Mike Rasmussen said.

Poole dominated play on the offensive line this past fall for San Diego State, earning all-Mountain West honors, pancaking opponents who crossed his path.

"I also got my degree at San Diego State in December and made the conference all-academic team," Poole proudly stated.

A tackle throughout his collegiate career at MPC and San Diego State, Poole began taking reps at guard at the East-West Shrine Game to enhance his draft stock.

"When I've visited teams, a lot of them have expressed an interest in me as a tackle and guard," Poole said. "Most teams only travel with eight offensive linemen. Versatility helps."

So does talent.

Poole enhanced his stock at the NFL combines, where he finished in the top 10 among all offensive linemen in every drill, running a 5.0 second 40-yard dash and bench pressing 225 pounds 25 times.

"I was able to showcase my athletic ability," Poole said. "Scouts said they were impressed with my drill work. They could see that I play tackle or guard."

The real twister at the NFL combines was the Wonderlic test," Poole laughed. "But I was prepared for it. I didn't hear anything back. So I guess everything is OK."

Poole has put together a management team, having hired former 49ers center Jeremy Newberry as his agent.

"He doesn't pull any punches," Poole said. "He's helped me a lot."

Poole has not been afraid to seek out advice, whether it's from Newberry or his former coaches at Seaside in Al Avila or at MPC in Rasmussen.

"Terry is one of the greatest success stories you'll ever want to see," said Rasmussen earlier this year. "Every day it was tough love. He straightened his life out. Football can be a great vehicle for life."

Poole is trying to become the third former Seaside athlete in the past five years to be drafted, joining current Buffalo Bills linebacker Ty Powell and newly acquired Chicago Bears linebacker Mason Foster, who spent his first three years with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

"I ran into Mason when I was in Florida for the East-West Shrine Game," Poole said. "He came to watch a practice. He just said keep driving."

If Poole is drafted, he will become the sixth Monterey County player in the NFL, joining, Powell, Foster, current Bears quarterback David Fales (Palma) and Buccaneers guard Evan Smith (Salinas). North Salinas grad Kassim Osgood is currently a free agent.

"It's all self-drive right now," said Poole, who will work out at MPC this week. "I'm staying in shape and waiting for the big day. I'm trying not to get too excited. But yeah, it's getting close."

Area roundup: Hartnell, MPC distance runners win Nor Cal titles

Hartnell College distance ace Diego Leon and Monterey Peninsula College's Anna Welsh both won Northern California titles Friday in the 10,000-meter run at College of San Mateo.

Leon, a state champion in cross country last fall for the Panthers, breezed to a title in 31 minutes, 14.83 seconds. He also qualified for the Nor Cal finals next week in the 1,500.

The Panthers currently have an eight-point lead in the men's division while the women have a nine-point lead going into next Friday's finals at American River College in Sacramento.

Welsh held off the Panthers' Malena Grover and Brandi Hobson in the 10,000, clocking 38:19.94. All three have qualified for the state championships on May 16.

Hartnell freshman Chase Pacheco, who has already qualified for the state championships in the decathlon, advanced to the Nor Cal finals in the high jump and long jump.

Frankie Gutierrez was the second qualifier in the javelin with a mark of 180-3 while Hartnell hammer school record older Dustin Samms was the No. 2 qualifier with a mark of 174-4. Marcus Washington also qualified in the long jump.

Taylor Blaha, who qualified last month for the state meet in the heptathlon, qualified in the triple jump while Linda Delgado ran 58.74 to advance into the 400 finals.

Former Seaside High, MPC lineman taken in third round by Seattle

Five teams were sending Terry Poole messages as Saturday's third day of the NFL draft heated up.

All of them told him to get ready and stay by your phone.

Each time one of those teams' turns came up, Poole could feel the anxiety and nervous tension grow in a room with his parents and agent Jeremy Newberry.

"Which team is going to take me?" Poole said.

He didn't have to wait long. Prior to Poole's name and hometown being flashed on the television screen, the former Seaside High and Monterey Peninsula College offensive lineman got a call from Seattle.

"The general manager John Schneider called and asked how I was doing," Poole said. "He said I hope you're having a good day and congrats on being a Seahawk."

A vision became a reality for the 6-foot-5, 310 pound Poole as he was taken in the fourth round by Seattle — the 130th overall player chosen in the NFL draft.

"It's a trip seeing your name and face come up with your home turf," Poole said. "Man, I'm glad I'm a Seahawk."

Poole was the 25th offensive lineman taken in the draft.

He also becomes the third-highest player from Monterey County to be selected, behind current Carolina head coach Ron Rivera, who was taken in the second round by the Bears in 1984, and Mason Foster, who chosen in the third round by Tampa Bay in 2012.

Having played offensive tackle throughout his high school and college career, the 23-year-old Poole was drafted by the Seahawks as a guard.

"I'm going to be a swing player," Poole said. "They told me I could possibly play center as well. I'm going to learn all five line positions. This is a blessing."

With the addition of Poole, the Seahawks currently have 12 offensive linemen on their roster.

"I'm going in with the thought of taking someone's position and starting," Poole said.

Growing up a Raiders fan, the recent San Diego State graduate will be coached on the offensive line by former Raiders head coach Tom Cable.

"I'm going to get to work with one of the best," Poole said.

Of all the teams that Poole worked out for, Seattle was the one team that brought him up for a visit in March, where he met head coach Pete Carroll and a handful of players.

"I met the whole coaching staff," Poole said. "I got a good vibe right away. They got to know me as a person and my character. Coach makes you love football even more."

After two dominating seasons at MPC, Poole started the last two years for San Diego State, earning all-conference honors as a tackle, as well as all-academic honors.

He took part in the East-West Shrine Game and the NFL combines, where his stock grew after running a 5.09-second 40-yard dash and finishing in the top 10 in every category for offensive linemen.

Poole is the third former Seaside High player to be drafted in the last five years, joining Foster, who now plays for the Bears as a linebacker, and Bills linebacker Ty Powell.

Ironically, Powell was drafted by Seattle in 2013.

He's also the third former MPC player in the last three years to be drafted, joining Powell and former Palma quarterback and Chicago Bears backup David Fales.

"It's a business and I understand that," Poole said. "But it's a great thing loving where you work and who you work for. And loving what you're doing."

Poole will leave in five days for Seattle to attend a rookie mini-camp.

During his visit to Seattle, he reunited with former San Diego State teammate Eric Pinkins, who is in his third year with the team.

"I couldn't be in a better situation," Poole said. "It's a great city, a great team and a great environment. I want to get involved in the community like I did in San Diego. I can't wait to be in that stadium and here the 12th man."
