Prepositional phrases



 A phrase is not a sentence; it does <u>not</u> contain a subject and verb.

*in the café*A prepositional phrase consists of a preposition and its object (a noun or pronoun)

to her

• The subject of a sentence can <u>NEVER</u> be found in a prepositional phrase. Prepositional phrases can tell us in which direction the action is moving. In this case, we can think of Robert's action moving toward the woman.



Prepositional phrases can also specify a location.

Robert proposed to her

in the café.

Prepositional phrases add lots of thrilling information!

- The girl <u>with the long red hair</u> ran away <u>with the</u> <u>money</u>.
- Pablo met his future wife <u>at his best friend's house.</u>
- <u>At the end of the novel</u>, <u>after an exciting chase</u>, the lovers flee <u>to Mexico</u>.
