Transitions

Transitions are the words used to make a change from one topic to another--they create a bridge to make it easier for the reader to understand the material.

Transitions for <u>descriptions</u> tell where something occurs (Space):

at the left, right in the center on the side, beside along the street, river, etc. along the edge on top, above below, beneath, under

over straight ahead at the top, bottom surrounding opposite at the rear, front, side in front of behind, in back of next, next to, close to nearby in the distance, beyond in the background in the foreground within sight, out of sight

Transitions for <u>narratives</u> tell when something happens (Time):

after before then, now next last, at last, at first first, second, third, etc. in the morning, evening, etc. during the morning, etc. for a minute, hour, week

ordinarily generally later to begin with afterwards one time at the same time at 8 a.m., etc.

Transitions for directions help to keep things in order (Process):

after, before	once	at last, finally
also	next	now, then
as soon as	first, second, third, etc.	when

Transitions for information help to organize material (Sequence):

also moreover in addition to besides therefore meanwhile another consequently for instance furthermore in the second place but, yet again, since on the contrary in contrast contrariwise otherwise in other words to sum up, in conclusion another point nevertheless inasmuch as in fact however as a result, thus on the other hand in the same way for example when likewise, similarly although, even though instead for, because

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
