- ✓ Comprehensive Facilities Condition Assessment – Fall 2019 & Spring 2020
- ✓ 2020-25 Facilities & Technology Master Plan – Spring 2020
- ✓ Community Outreach – Spring 2020



Addressing Facilities Needs

- MPC has served the community well for over 70 years, but aging local facilities need repairs and updates
- Facilities have asbestos, lead pipes, and do not meet proper earthquake safety standards
- Upgrades needed to give students the tools they need to complete their first two years of college affordably



Local Funding to Renovate and Upgrade MPC

- Recent local survey commissioned by MPC found 66% support for an investment to improve local facilities
- Accordingly, the Board of Trustees unanimously voted to place a Measure V, a \$230 million local facilities bond measure, on the November ballot
- Measure V would cost property owners \$18 per \$100,000 of assessed (not market) value annually while bonds are outstanding
 - Approximately \$87 per year for typical homeowner



Measure V on November Ballot

If approved by 55% of local voters, Measure V could:

- Repair leaky roofs, old rusty plumbing and dry rotted beams
- Replace faulty electrical systems to improve energy efficiency and upgrade facilities so the College can operate in a more environmentally sustainable way
- Keep instructional technology up-to-date and computer systems
- Upgrade classrooms and labs to help local students complete the first two years of college affordably and transfer to the Cal State or UC system

Measure V on November Ballot

If approved by 55% of local voters, Measure V could:

- Make the computer and technology upgrades needed for students to be able to take classes, listen to lectures and complete assignments online
- Upgrade classrooms, student support areas, and career training facilities for science, technology, engineering, math, computer science, healthcare, hospitality and nursing
- Build the classrooms and labs needed to expand courses and degree programs offered to students in Marina and Seaside including expanding facilities at the Marina Education Center to increase instructional and student service opportunities
- Provide a comprehensive first responder training facility to train students, veterans, and existing law enforcement, fire protection and emergency medical professionals

Fiscal Accountability Required

- A project list, Citizens' Oversight Committee and independent audits are required
- All funds raised by Measure V would stay local
- No funds could be taken away by the State
- By law, no money could be spent on administrators' salaries or pensions
- If approved, Measure V would help MPC qualify for up to \$230 million in state matching funds
