Course Description: This course examines the interaction of language with society and the individual and how language establishes power, ethnicity, gender, and social identity. Students are also introduced to linguistic diversity in US society today and methodology for sociolinguistic analysis of conversations. Also offered as Ethnic Studies 45; credit may be earned only once.

- Analyze a conversation socio-linguistically
- Assess the role that language plays in forming the values, concepts, and beliefs held by individuals and society

GRADING:

This course awards letter grades (LG) unless you opt to receive a Credit/No Credit (CR/NC) grade. Discuss this option with a counselor if you are considering it. A special "Pass/No Pass (P/NP) Grade Request Form" must be submitted during the first weeks of the semester to be eligible for this option. The grading scale is

A/P = 100 - 90%B/P = 89 - 80%C/P = 79 - 70%D/NP = 69 - 60%F/NP = 59% or lower

Grades are calculated by the following formula:

DISCUSSIONS = 25% of the total grade

You need a total of 40 points in the Discussions to receive full credit for this portion of the class.

The weekly online Discussions are our primary means of communication. They take the place of class lectures and discussions. The Discussions are used to review the class content and help

each other understand the course material, so your responses to the Discussion prompts (your **postings**) are extremely important to us all. In addition, it is equally important that we build a community of learners in our class, so your **replies** to other students' postings are just as important! We need to know that people are "listening" to what we are "saying." We take turns **posting** or **replying** most weeks.

Our class is divided into two groups called **Red** and **Blue**. Find your group for the semester by clicking **RED and BLUE GROUP MEMBERSHIP** in the Week One Module. Our Discussion schedule follows:

Even numbered weeks (2, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, and 14) - Group **Red posts** on the Discussion and Group **Blue replies** to those postings. **Always** begin your **posting** by telling us the prompt number you are responding to. **Always** begin your **reply** with the person's name you are responding to. Just <u>one posting</u> or reply per person is scored each week.

Odd numbered weeks (1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13 and 15) - Group **Blue posts** on the Discussion and Group **Red replies** to those postings. **Always** begin your posting by telling us the prompt number you are responding to. **Always** begin your reply with the person's name you are responding to. Just <u>one posting</u> or reply per person is scored each week.

It is not necessary for you to be active in each weekly Discussion. Of course, I would like you to follow each Discussion, but you are only required to reach **40** points in the Discussions for full credit for this section of the class. Keep track of your points as the semester continues. You are limited to just <u>one</u> scored posting or reply in any week's Discussion. Your Discussion participation is evaluated according to the following formula:

Points are awarded as follows:

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Discussion posting 75-150 words in length ** = 1 point
Discussion posting 151-250 words in length ** = 3 points
Discussion posting 250 words or longer ** = 5 points
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Discussion reply 50-75 words in length ** = 1 point Discussion reply 76-100 words in length ** = 2 points Discussion reply 101 words or longer ** = 3 points

****** Your CANVAS typing screen records word count in the lower right corner before posting.

***CAUTION!** While the semester is in progress, CANVAS grades indicates your class percentage according to the quizzes you have

completed. When the semester ends, zeroes are added to your grade calculation for any missed quizzes. This may lower your total percentage for the class.
