## MPC Cameras-on Policy: Approved by Senate 3/18/21

MPC prohibits faculty from requiring cameras-on during online classes except when...

1. Student learning outcomes (SLOs), course objectives, or requirements from regulatory bodies associated with programs cannot be realized without cameras-on, as determined by the instructor for the course, and
2. Notice that cameras-on is a requirement is included as a comment in the schedule when possible, and given on the syllabus and orally in the first week of class or earlier, and
3. Faculty require cameras-on only to the extent necessary (i.e., proctoring, skill demonstration), and allow students to use appropriate video backgrounds and/or flexibility to turn off the camera unless needed, and
4. Faculty share with students the available campus resources for internet and technology needs
