The original is to be retained in the President's office on campus, as well as a copy in the College's Title IX Coordinator's office. Failure to complete and file all pages of the Form R-4 and verification that the EADA Report has been filed by November 1 will result in the forfeiture of all completed contests until the form is received by the CCCAA Office. Verification can be provided by submitting an electronic copy of the completion certificate available on the bottom of the Survey Navigation /Status screen of the EADA by the individual who submitted/locked the online EADA Survey or a screenshot of the EADA webpage which states the EADA Survey was locked. The college uses feedback from students, athletic coaches, as well as survey results to determine and respond to interest in intercollegiate athletics. The college has conducted interest surveys for eight years. Results from the interest surveys indicate interest in three women's sports: (1) cross country, (2) swimming/diving, and (3) beach/sand volleyball. Each of these areas is discussed below. In addition, we discuss an additional women's sport, soccer, as the college has struggled with actual participation in this sport.

(1) Cross Country

In the fall of 2015 the college made the decision to hire a full-time instructor/coach with responsibilities in men's and women's track and field. To maximize the potential of this position, a decision was made to reinstate the men's and women's cross country programs (which had been discontinued a few years earlier). As student interest surveys indicated sufficient interest in cross country, and a full-time instructor/coach available to recruit and support the student athletes, it was felt that the programs would be successful. The plan came to fruition in the Fall 2016; the college was able to compete with a full squad for both men's and women's teams.

2) Swimming/Diving

The college has monitored the survey results related to women's swimming/diving on an annual basis. Aside from the 2014-15 year, there has been interest in women's swimming since the athletic interest survey was fully implemented in the 2012-13 year. In response to the survey results, the college hosted two meetings since 2014 to better gauge interest in women's swimming. Students who expressed interest in women's swimming via the interest survey were invited to the meeting. In addition, the Athletic Director also extended the invitation to the entire student population via an "ALL USERS" email sent to all students enrolled at the college. The meeting was also advertised through flyers that were placed at strategic locations throughout the campus. The first meeting, held in spring 2014, drew only two interested students. The second meeting, held in fall 2019, was to gauge interest in women's swimming or in women's beach/sand volleyball. The used the same advertisement process for the fall 2019 meeting that it used in spring 2014. Twenty-two students attended the fall 2019 meeting with about half interested in beach/sand volleyball and the other half in women's swimming.

(3) Beach/Sand Volleyball

During the past three years, results from the athletic interest survey indicated interest in women's beach/sand volleyball. On the most recent survey, conducted during 2019-20, there were seventeen (17) women applicants who expressed interest in this sport (a team consists of 10-12 players). As noted above, in the fall 2019 semester, the college held a student interest meeting to gauge interest in both women's swimming and women's beach/sand volleyball. On October 24th, 2019, subsequent to the student interest meeting, a meeting was held between Vice President of Student Services, Laurence Walker, and Dean of Student Services, Lyndon Schutzler, to discuss the direction of a response. It was determined that the sport with the highest probability of success (in terms of fielding a team) was women's beach/sand volleyball. In consultation with the college president, David Martin, a decision was made to offer women's beach/sand volleyball in the 2020-21 year.

(4) Soccer

The college established a women's soccer team in fall 2008. Interest in women's soccer, measured by the interest survey, has been strong and consistent since the survey was implemented in the 2012-13 year. However, actual participation has waned in interest years, and the college had to temporarily suspend the team due to an insufficient number of players. The college will continue to monitor the survey results as well as the number of high school participants in its recruiting area. The college will reinstate team if there are enough participants.
