Please answer the following five questions succinctly but completely. These are the questions that will be asked by the State if an audit of materials charges is done.

1. What tangible personal property (material) would the student need and take from the class?

These fees are to cover the cost of the 2 two main Career assessments (MBTI and SII), printing the assessment results and the course materials covered during the class.

2. Does the material have continuing value to the student outside of the classroom?

Yes. Students have enrolled in this course to find career direction. These materials are used as a guide to give the students a direction and can be resurrected in need of future career searches if needed.

3. How does this material relate to the required objectives of the course?

This course is designed for students interested in learning more about themselves and the world of work before making a career choice. It includes self-assessments, career exploration, career trends and workplace issues, decision-making, and college and career planning.

These formal assessments are the industry standard used to begin career exploration.

4. Are the materials provided to the students at, or below, the retail costs of those materials?

Yes. The break down for the individual assessment materials are as follows:

- MBTI = \$13.95
- S.I.I. = \$9.25
- Total: 23.20

The remaining \$6.80 will be used to help offset the cost of color printing assessment results and printed support materials for activities, theories and information needed for successful completion of the course.

5. If the college charges a fee rather than have students furnish the materials, why do students have to pay a fee to the college rather than supply the materials themselves? (Identify if there are there health or safety reasons for the college providing the materials.)

Rather than using paper assessment that must be sent off to Washington for scoring, we have an online assessment account though the testing administrator that students do not have access to on their own. The fee would be used to cover the cost for the assessment tools.
