C. Rationale for the Position

1. Description of need. Please include information on the effects on the program, your division, the college, and the community of filling the position versus not filling it.

Sociology is an important and popular component of MPC's general education pattern, as well as an important degree and transfer major. Lower division Sociology classes are frequently required by Universities for students planning on majoring in Social Work. Many students take Sociology 40 Marriage and Family Life not only to fulfill GE requirements, but also to better understand their own life.

The Sociology department did have another fulltime instructor who taught two classes every semester for Sociology and three for Psychology (Gary Jepson who retired a few years ago.). The department offers an AA degree and is transferable to CSU and UC campuses. The department currently offers 5 courses:

- Sociology 1 Humanity and Society
- Sociology 2 Contemporary Social Problems
- Sociology 3 Introduction to Social Psychology (co-listed as Psych 3)
- Sociology 9 Women in Contemporary Society (co-listed as Women 9)
- Sociology 40 Marriage and Family Life

and previously included the Social Sciences Research Methods class which was eliminated from the division offerings a few years ago, but a Sociology research methods class should be part of a complete lower division curriculum.

Sociology classes required or for an option for other degrees or certificates at MPC:

Reflections about the Replacement Positions:

The Social Sciences Division met twice to discuss the replacements-Sept 16 and Oct. 7, 2011. We had lengthy discussions about the need for each of the four replacements we are asking for

- a. ADMJ
- b. PSYC

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- c. SOCI
- d. WOMN.

On 10/7/11 the Division voted to rank the four positions. 12 faculty voted. 11 of the 12 voted PSYC number 1, or 91 % felt PSYC was our first need. One person voted SOCI number 1 and 7 voted SOCI second place. 4 voted WOMN second place and 8 third place. 10 voted ADMJ fourth place.

Thus our ranking is

- a. PSYC
- b. SOCI
- c. WOMN
- d. ADMJ.

I do want to note that there was strong support to continue advocating for Women's Studies.

The recruitment and evaluation of adjunct faculty is challenging for division colleagues not knowledgeable of the field of Sociology; scheduling classes is also challenging and an additional workload for the division chair who also has vacancies in Women's Studies, Psychology, and Administration of Justice, and 4 non-tenured faculty.

All sections of Sociology were taught by adjunct faculty in Fall 2011, and all were closed. Two sections were cancelled because there were not faculty to teach them.

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
